Odds are one of the other libraries has it, and you can either pick it up there or have it delivered here within 1-2 days!

Try everything from learning a new language, to listening to a book, doing genealogy, looking at recipes from other countries, and reading newspapers online. So before the snow flies, stop by and we will update your card and show you how to use these resources!

(You might remember us switching to a new computer system this past year.) The goal of all of this is to make the library more convenient for you and to give you access to more resources.

The Libraries


You can use your new card at the Coplay Public Library, Dimmick Memorial Library, Emmaus Public Library, Lehighton Area Memorial Library, Public Library of Catasauqua, Lower Macungie Library, Palmerton Area Library, Parkland Community Library, Slatington Library, Southern Lehigh Public Library, and Whitehall Township Public Library. These libraries are now collectively known as the **Lehigh Carbon Library Cooperative** (LCLC). Come to our front desk to get a list of these libraries with their contact information so that you can check them out.

What You Can Do

- I. **Check out** books from any of these libraries and **return** those books to any of these libraries as well. (Remember that loaning periods, fees, and other policies may vary by library, so remember to ask about those.)
- 2. Put a book on **hold** at any of these libraries.
- 3. Access **library databases** and **electronic resources** from home. (Go through the website of your home library and use the number on the back of your card as your user ID.)
- 4. Access **your account** from home to check your borrowing record (once you've enabled that feature), renew items, and more.

Book Nook: Happy February!

My intent was to write about St. Valentine's Day and include some suggestions for romantic books and movies. My husband and I agreed on our top romantic picks. The movie Robin Hood, any version, but we're partial to Errol Flynn and Olivia de Haviland. Our choice for most romantic book by a living author is *Outlander* by Diana Galbadon. Then I started researching the holiday, but it turns out that February I4 commemorates the day Valentine of Rome was beheaded. Not a happy thought.

Often, St. Valentine is depicted as Cupid so I researched the Greek version known as Eros. Most of us learned in school that Eros was the son of Aphrodite, but there are many pre-Grecian Eros origin stories, and that got confusing. So I skipped that.

How about the word "romance"? It turns out to be a regional French word dating to the 1300s to describe a story of chivalry, or knights' adventures. The aspect of love was added to romance in the 17th century. Now, as a genre, "romance" usually refers to an exaggerated tale of love.

I also learned about other observances besides Valentine's Day this February, including Groundhog Day on the 2nd, Chinese New Year on the 5th, and Presidents' Day on the 18th. Groundhog Day originated in Pennsylvania – yay! It was preceded by Candlemas, a Catholic feast that included weather-predicting traditions, and various pagan holidays that fell around this time of year.

This year's symbol for Chinese New Year is the pig, usually atop a pile of coins, and associated with good fortune and wealth. I wondered if this might be the origin of a piggy bank. What little I could find implied that in Medieval times, a clay called "pygg" was used for most housewares because metal and glass were very expensive. I don't know about you, but since the Chinese zodiac predates the Middle Ages by about 4,000 years, I think the origin is more Asian than European. What do you think?


I am old enough to remember when Abraham Lincoln's birthday, February 12, and George Washington's birthday, February 22, were separate observances. We went to school on those days, the banks were open, and the mail was delivered. But in 1971, President Richard M. Nixon signed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act that merged the birthdays, now Presidents Day, to the 3rd Monday in February, and is supposed to honor all U.S. presidents. This act also moved Memorial Day, Columbus Day, and Veterans Day to Mondays.

I used many research sources available through our library. I strongly urge you to use more than Wikipedia to gather your facts, and remind you that the most reliable information comes from cited sources. You, as a taxpayer, are paying for some amazing library references in books and on our website, so check them out, and thank you for providing them to our community!

Database Spotlight: ABC Mouse

ABC Mouse is an early learning academy that helps kids build all kinds of skills they'll need in school. It helps them learn to read through phonics, and it teaches lessons in math, social studies, art, music, and much more. This is one of two databases that you can only access while in our library building (the other being Ancestry), but it's well worth the trip to help your kids learn in a fun way that's based on their age groups. There's a lot to explore on ABC Mouse, including:

- **My Learning Path** Kids who are new to reading might want to start on this path that has a series of lessons and activities that build off of each other.
- Classroom If your kid wants to learn about a specific subject, he can check out this colorful and inviting virtual space. There's a lot to click on and explore, and of course, there's a lot to learn as well.
- **Featured Activities** When a kid has a little bit of time to fill and doesn't know what to try next, this is the place to try out something new and get some general knowledge.
