From the Director's Desk!

We would like to wish all of patrons a Happy and Healthy 2019! With a **NEW YEAR**, comes **NEW** changes to WTPL!

We are happy to announce that we are expanding our library hours. Beginning Wednesday, January 2, 2019, the library will have NEW hours! On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday we'll be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.; on Friday and Saturday we'll be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Pick up one of our NEW magnets with the NEW hours! We will be open 64 hours a week, and you'll still have access to our online resources and website 24/7 if we are closed!

With the **NEW YEAR**, WTPL will be part of the NEW **Lehigh-Carbon Library Cooperative**. This will mean more resources and services for patrons to use and share among other libraries. We will be creating a one-card system by February 2019. Watch for more information and flyers at the library.

The libraries in LCLC include: Coplay Public Library, Dimmick Memorial Public Library, Emmaus Public Library, Lehighton Area Memorial Library, Public Library of Catasauqua, Lower Macungie Public Library, Palmerton Area Library, Parkland Community Library, Slatington Library, Southern Lehigh Public Library and Whitehall Township Public Library.

How does this help YOU!?! Patrons will have **one library card** and will be able to use our 10 partnering libraries in Lehigh and Carbon counties. You may borrow materials from one and return them to another library listed on the handout. If you need a book from one of the LCLC libraries, place a **hold** and we will deliver it to your library for you. We are proud and happy to have these services for our patrons and to share the free resources between our neighboring libraries!

If the library is closed for any reason, you'll still have access to resources. If you have a current WTPL card and in good standing, you can use any of the databases located on the right side of our website. You can do anything from learning a new language, to listening to a book, working on genealogy, looking at recipes from other countries, and reading newspapers online. So before the snow-flies, stop by, and we will update your card and show you how to use these resources!

The library received a notice from Harrisburg for the state of PA to save money, the PA Department of Revenue will no longer be sending **tax forms** to libraries, including Rent Rebate forms. All forms will be accessible at www.revenue.pa.gov to fill out online. If you do not have access to a computer or printer, the library will print your forms for \$.10 per page.

Did You Know?

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is celebrated on the 3rd Monday of lanuary every year because it's near King's birthday of January 15, 1929. During the Civil Rights Movement in the '50s & '60s, King was the main spokesperson for nonviolent activism. He encouraged desegregation with events such as boycotting segregated buses and occupying public spaces with marches and sit-ins. You can read more about this movement in books such as the graphic novel trilogy March by Congressman John Lewis.

If you like coming out to regular activities and clubs, the library has a few that you might want to check out.

For **kids**, we have **Creation Station** at 6:30 p.m. on the 1st Tuesday of every month, giving kids a chance to build with Legos, blocks, and other items. This month, since we're closed on January 1, Creation Station will be on Tues., January 8.

Adults can enjoy the Adult Coloring Club twice a month, from 11 a.m. - 12:45 p.m. on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of every month. On the 4th Tuesday, it's followed up by our Adult Book Talks from 1 - 2 p.m.

People of **any age** can attend our **Open Mic/Jam** as audience members or performers at 6:30 p.m. on the 3rd Monday of every month. (If you want to perform, the sign-up for time slots starts at 6:15.) There's also a **Family Movie Night** every 3rd Tuesday (details below). Those who enjoy honing their crafting skills might also enjoy coming out for our **Beading Club**, which is every Monday and Thursday at 1:30 p.m., or the **Lehigh Valley Knitting Guild** on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of every month from 6 - 8 p.m.

At the Movies: The House With a Clock in Its Walls

Based on a book of the same name by John Bellairs, this fantasy film is about a young orphan named Lewis Barnavelt who aids his magical uncle in locating a clock with the power to bring about the end of the world. 
Last Month

- **PA Photos & Documents** You can search for keywords if you're looking for specific photos or documents, or you can browse some of the many collections including <u>Art and Architecture</u>, <u>Church and Missionary History</u>, <u>Pennsylvania History</u>, <u>School and College History</u>, <u>Women's History</u>, and <u>Yearbooks</u>.
